



Parental Access and Family Facilities Survey Update 2018 - Adult Wards

Your hospital has been identified as treating some children and young people on adult wards. When we refer to children and young people, we mean people up to their 16th birthday.

Introduction

Since 1985, Children's Health Scotland, formerly known as Action for Sick Children Scotland, has carried out surveys every few years of hospitals in Scotland that admit children and young people in order to monitor the availability of parental access and family facilities. The findings have been extremely useful for healthcare planners and providers at all levels within Scotland's NHS.

This 2018 survey will capture information on parental access and family facilities within all NHS hospitals in Scotland. The results of the survey, which is funded and supported by the Scottish Government, will be placed in the public domain and will inform the Scottish Government's policy making in relation to the healthcare of children and young people in Scotland. We are grateful for your cooperation in providing information on services for children and young people.

In return, we will supply your Health Board with data showing how your ward or unit compares against the Scottish average for each question in the Survey and provide examples of best practice. All data will be anonymised before being shared or published so that no individual or ward can be identified. You will notice in the questionnaire that there are occasional questions to clarify which type of ward you are completing the survey for - this is to allow us to route you to questions which are appropriate for your ward type.
